

> Publications include peer-reviewed articles, reports, and other published written documents available online.






## How much adaptation is happening in the Yukon?




## What kinds of adaptation projects are happening?



## Who is leading adaptation?




**Project lead** - main proponent Project partner - explicitly listed as a partner with the lead organization **Participant/collaborator** - mentioned in the project description of another organization's project

## Where is adaptation happening?

Number of projects that are Yukon-wide 24 There was a broad range of Yukon-wide project topics. The most common topics were conservation (6), health (3), and wildfire (2).

### Data collection and analysis

Interviews with senior public sector Key themes: stakeholders (e.g., planners, engineers, emergency 16 management, executive leadership, elected officials)

Review of planning and policy documents (e.g., official community plans, sustainability plans, zoning by-laws, adaptation plans, etc.)

Field observations to understand local context

# Institutional organization

- Availability of resources
- Alignment of goals with adaptation

- Organizational collaboration
- Agency & flexibility

Support: understanding public interest and support for climate change adaptation

**Public engagement:** understanding the scope of public engagement undertaken in the Yukon in relation to climate change and adaptation

Indigenous knowledge: Support for Yukon First Nation knowledge and approaches to adaptation
