Seminar and Workshop, 2nd-3rd May 2024

Danish Institute for International Studies, Copenhagen (hybrid format)

A public seminar in hybrid format (both in person and online) on *Sovereignty, History and Archives* will be held on the afternoon of Thursday 2nd May at the Danish Institute for International Studies (DIIS). Confirmed speakers for the event are:

Funding

Grant applications have been submitted to the International Arctic Science Committee and the University of the Arctic to pursue the subgroup's research. We should be informed of the success or otherwise of the applications in April and May respectively.

The 2023 grant application to the Icelandic Centre of Research (Rannís) for the project: "Decolonising Archives in Iceland, Greenland and Inuit Nunangat" was unfortunately not successful. The team are reflecting on the feedback from the reviewers and preparing a revised application for the 2025-27 funding period. The application deadline is 14th June 2024 and funding decisions are shared in January 2025.

In 2022, a U Arctic Thematic Network on <u>Decolonization of Arctic Library and Archives</u>
<u>Metadata (DALAM)</u> was established under the leadership of Susanna Parikka at U Lapland..
